



Outdoors After School COVID-19 Health & Safety Plan

CCWA - Paradise Farm Camps follows the recommendations from the Pennsylvania Department of Health, the Centers for Disease Control, and the American Camp Association in creating procedures to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. CCWA's Health & Safety Plan utilizes the PA Office of Child Development and Early Learning Child Care Facility template, and includes prevention, mitigation, and response.

PREVENTION

SCREENING POLICIES

CCWA will screen staff and Outdoors After School program participants daily, checking temperature using an infrared thermometer. Staff will wear gloves and masks when performing screening. Screening questions will cover COVID-19 symptoms and possible exposure to this novel coronavirus, including:

- Has the participant been diagnosed with COVID-19 in the past 14 days?
- Is the participant currently experiencing any of the 2 following symptoms: fever, cough, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, headache, loss of taste or smell?
- In the past 48 hours, has anyone in your household visited an area of increased COVID-19 risk or come into close contact with someone diagnosed with COVID-19?

CHILD DROP-OFF AND PICK-UP POLICIES

Only enrolled participants may exit the car during drop off and pick up. There will be a one-way path for the entrance and exit of camp. Participants must be screened prior to exiting their vehicle. No visitors will be allowed on site for the duration of this program.

MITIGATION

FACE MASK/SHIELD POLICY

All participants and staff are required to wear face masks or face shields, unless they are exempt under [Section 3](#) of the Order of the Secretary of the Pennsylvania Department of Health Requiring Universal Face Coverings, or are able to maintain a distance of 6 feet apart in an outdoor setting. Participants and staff should provide their own masks; CCWA will have extra disposable masks for those that may forget. It is recommended that participants bring two masks, in case one gets wet, sweaty, or dirty.

CLEANING/SANITATION POLICIES (INCLUDING HANDWASHING GUIDELINES) Participants and staff will sanitize their hands upon arrival at camp. They will wash their hands upon arrival

and departure of all Activity Areas using soap and water for at least 20 seconds or, if hands are not visibly soiled, hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. We will also teach coughing/sneezing etiquette, limit sharing, establish physical distancing, and intensify cleaning and disinfection. We will clean all equipment and spaces after use with EPA approved disinfectants and following industry guidelines, and clean restrooms daily.

USE OF INDOOR SPACE & VENTILATION

Participants will remain outside for the entirety of the program, unless they are utilizing the restroom. Restroom occupancy will be limited to 2 at a time. Restrooms will remain ventilated through the use of overhead exhaust fans.

DRINKING FOUNTAINS

Participants will be able to refill their water bottles, but not drink directly out of our drinking fountains.

RESPONSE

SICK POLICIES

All staff and participants are required to stay home while ill. If an individual is positive for symptoms or has a temperature of or higher than 100.4°F upon arrival, the information will be recorded and the individual will be asked to go home and call their health care provider.

If a participant presents a high temperature or other symptoms of COVID-19 during the camp day, we will notify parents and will isolate the youth within the Program Center until they can be picked up and taken home. Staff that are physically able to drive, may be escorted to their car with proper PPE worn by both ill staff member and escort.

POSITIVE DIAGNOSIS & EXPOSURE

Should the individual be **positively diagnosed** with COVID-19, CCWA will maintain confidentiality of the individual at all times while mitigating the situation. The case will be reported to the Chester County Department of Health and all families and staff of the individual's group will be notified immediately so they can self-monitor and get tested. All facilities that the individual came in contact with will be deep cleaned and disinfected as per CDC guidelines. All participants and staff who came in close contact (less than six feet for more than 15 minutes) will be required to remain home and quarantine for 14 days. Camper tuition will be credited, and Staff will be compensated for this time.

In the event of a **potential** exposure, we will immediately inform parents/legal guardians about any potential contact their children may have had with suspected or confirmed cases.

RETURNING TO CAMP

Individuals that **have not tested positive for COVID-19** may return to camp if/when: they have an improvement in respiratory symptoms, such as coughing or shortness of breath and are 72 hours fever-free, without fever-reducing medication OR they have two negative COVID-19 tests, more than 24 hours apart.

Individuals **who test positive for COVID-19** may return to camp if/when: There have been at least 10 days since first symptoms, it has been 72 hours since all symptoms have improved, and they have been fever-free for 72 hours without fever reducing medication OR they have TWO negative COVID-19 tests, more than 24 hours apart, a resolution of fever without fever-reducing medications, and improvement in respiratory symptoms (cough, shortness of breath).

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

TYPICAL SYMPTOMS

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea
- Low oxygen levels
- Inflammation

INFORMATION ON CONTACT TRACING

- Contact tracing determines all people who could have been exposed to a potentially Covid+ person
- CDC defines close contact as interactions within 6 ft for more than 15 minutes
- True contact tracing is only handled by trained staff/volunteers or public health professionals
- Camps can help by identifying those persons potentially exposed, and asking them to self quarantine until a confirmed diagnosis is received
